

# DESIGNING FOR ACCESSIBILITY

## Creating Instructional Documents Checklist

### Accessible Content Design

#### Hierarchical Structure

- Use styles to identify hierarchical elements (i.e., headings, body copy, lists, etc.).
- Heading levels progress in a logical order.
- Tables are not used for layout purposes.
- Include internal navigation (bookmarks and hyperlinks).

#### Language

- Use inclusive language.
- Provide definitions for technical terms, abbreviations, and acronyms.
- Use headings and lists to break up chunks of text.
- Words are not hyphenated across lines of text.
- Limit use of all caps.
- Body copy is left-aligned.
- Body copy is written at an 8th-grade reading level.

#### Alt Text

- All meaningful images have alt text.
- Decorative images are left out of the reading order and/or are tagged as artifacts.

### Accessible Visual Design

#### Color & Contrast

- All text meets the WCAG Level AA minimum contrast ratios.
  - You can double check color contrast ratios using the [Web AIM Contrast Checker](#).
- Color is not used by itself to convey meaning.

#### Typography

- Use a clean and highly legible serif or sans serif font for body copy.
- The text weight and size should be easily readable.
- Use the default settings for line height (leading).
- If using heavily boded fonts:** Adjust letter spacing (tracking) to increase legibility.

### Additional Elements

- Use Paragraph Styles consistently throughout the document.
- Establish the content reading order in the Articles panel.
- Include the document title as metadata in the File Information.
- Use export settings optimized for accessibility.
- Instruct Acrobat Pro to use the document structure.
